
GEPETTO



CLOVER'S STORY:

Clover was born in rescue on April 25, 2022. At about 7 weeks old when all the puppies in his litter were transitioning to soaked kibble, we noticed that Clover would regurgitate the kibble.

Clover was diagnosed with Persistent Right Aortic Arch (PRAA). This is where

the right aortic arch fails to regress normally, resulting in constriction of the esophagus, and restricting food passage into the stomach. Then, at a specialist visit to discuss surgery, it was discovered that he has a heart murmur. After

an echocardiogram, another issue was revealed, Tricuspid Valve Dysplasia.

On September 20, Clover had his surgery for PRAA and is doing very well in his recovery.

COST OF TESTING & SURGERY = \$5000





HANS SOLO'S STORY:

Hans Solo is a 2-year-old boy who developed a skin infection that primarily affected his rear left foot and leg. The infection also affected his other feet, side, and tail but not as bad as his left leg.

His owner was moving. With the move and the cost of his medication they needed to surrender him. We agreed to take him and while we were setting up a medical foster for him, he was dumped at the shelter!!! So, we pulled rescued from there. We then

took him to our vet, who ran tests and determined he had a staph infection.

Hans is currently on meds and medicated shampoo. It will take 1-2 months for him to

heal completely.







ROSITA'S STORY:

Rosita is a 1-year-old English Mastiff. One day when Rosita was running along the fence line chasing a car, she ran into a roll of fencing wire and sliced her side wide open. She ended up with a wound from

the top of her back to her abdomen. She got fixed up and sent home. The wound filled with fluid three different times after that. The last time, surgery was performed to remove necrotic skin tissue, but she did not have enough extra skin to close the wound. She was hospitalized and given wound care daily.

During this time, the owner fell at home, breaking his ribs and ankle. He was not able to bring Rosita home and care for her. RDR made the trip to New Mexico and brought Rosita back to Phoenix. She was placed in a foster home where the foster is also a vet technician.

Rosita had another surgery in September to close part of the wound.

She is doing well at home. It will take about 3-4



months for her to heal completely.

COST OF SURGERY = \$1500 MEDS & SUPPLIES = \$800/month



GRETA'S STORY:

Greta is a beautiful 2-year-old girl who, prior to rescue, had multiple litters. After the last one, she developed an infection in her mammary tissue. Her owner didn't take her for treatment, but instead surrendered her. We took her to the vet, and got her on antibiotics, but the mass grew.

We discussed spaying, removing the mass and sending it to be biopsied. Then the preliminary bloodwork came back heartworm positive. The spay and mass removal had to wait until she is heartworm free. Greta has started her treatment which

is a 3-4 month process.



COST OF HEARTWORM TREATMENT = \$2500 COST OF SPAY, MASS REMOVAL/PATHOLOGY = \$900 - \$1000

DOCTOR DROOL

WHAT IS BLOAT?

Bloat, is a generic term for "Gastric dilatation-volvulus complex (GDV)" and is a serious condition that is FATAL if left untreated. Bloat occurs when a dog's stomach fills with air, gas, food or fluid and subsequently twists. This condition will develop without any warning and can progress quickly. It is ALWAYS an EMERGENCY!! Great Danes are anatomically predisposed to bloat because of their deep, narrow chest. The chest is very tall, rather than wide. Other breeds with large, deep chests are also at risk of developing bloat.

Bloat (without twisting) is the beginning, and could progress to a full blown GDV, where the stomach twists and flips on its own axis, at any time. You will not know when this happens. It is this twisting and flipping of the stomach that creates a life-threatening condition. When the stomach becomes severely distended with gas, fluid, or food, it puts pressure on the surrounding organs and decreases the blood flow to and from these organs. The twisted stomach is more severe, as this completely obstructs blood supply to major organs and can impact the blood flow throughout the whole body, resulting in shock. This stage is referred to as gastric dilatation-volvulus (GDV).

As the stomach expands, and puts pressure on several large arteries and veins, the blood supply gets cut off to the stomach, toxic products build up and tissues begin to die. Every minute without treatment increases the risk of further damage and potential death.

CAUSES OF BLOAT:

- can happen to any age of dog risk increases with age
- eating very quickly
- overeating
- drinking a large quantity of water in a short period of time
- stress (anxious dogs thought to be more prone, and dogs in stressful situations/environments like boarding kennels)
- exercising after eating
- genetic factors

SIGNS OF BLOAT:

- restlessness, inability to get comfortable
- pale gums
- pacing
- swollen or distended abdomen
- painful abdomen, whining or crying if abdomen is touched
- overall look of distress, weakness
- retching or attempts to vomit with no success
- excessive drooling
- panting or rapid breathing
- collapse/inability to stand

Dogs with GDV, who do not receive treatment will NOT survive. However, dogs can survive this if treatment is prompt. Prompt meaning AS SOON AS POSSIBLE, within 1 hour or 2 at the most, if at all possible!! The risk of complications and poor outcome increases with the severity and as time increases.

GDV is a condition that must be treated surgically in order for the dog to survive. There is no "wait and see" approach that will prevent pain, suffering and eventual death.

PREVENTING BLOAT:

- feeding smaller meals, more frequently
- using a special bowl to slow down eating
- restricting activity 1-2 hours before and 1-2 hours after eating
- don't let the dog drink a large amount of water all at once
- avoid strenuous activity on a full stomach

WHAT TO DO IF YOU SUSPECT BLOAT:

- GET TO THE VET ASAP!!
 - call the vet on the way tell them you are coming in with suspected bloat
- GIVE GAS X (1 tablet) RIGHT AWAY

As well as doing everything above, the vet will need to remove part of the stomach and the spleen. He will also need to use powerful drugs to counteract shock.
